"GPC NOW CARRIES BOOKS BY JOHN ANDERSON BRAYTON, One of the Three Major Living Southern Genealogists," by Gary Boyd Roberts

With the retirement of John Frederick Dorman (and excluding Maryland and thus Robert Barnes and George E. and Donna V. Russell), there are now, in my opinion, three major genealogists whose printed works or other achievements have secured their status as the leading living Southern scholars in our field. These three very prolific Southern genealogists are John Anderson Brayton, Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck, and Brent H. Holcomb.

The latter two of these scholar-authors are well known to Genealogical Publishing Company (GPC) readers. Bockstruck has, over 30 years, transformed the formerly rather slight and sleepy Dallas Public Library into the major genealogical book collection in the entire South. He has published five volumes of transcriptions/indexes with GPC; these deal with Virginia's colonial soldiers and works listing naval pensioners over the first half of the 19th century, colonial and Revolutionary War and later bounty grants, and pre-1775 naturalizations.

Brent Holcomb, for more than 35 years, has edited and published the "South Carolina Magazine of Ancestral Research," the leading genealogical journal for its state and surrounding area. His volumes with GPC cover South Carolina marriages through 1820, and many volumes of North Carolina marriages or will abstracts by county; North or South Carolina land grants and naturalizations; and immigrants to Charleston, South Carolina, in the 1820s. Bockstruck and Holcomb are thus both authors of various record volumes for GPC, and virtual creators of the South's leading library and one of its best genealogical journals.

The third author in this triad is John Anderson Brayton of Memphis, Tennessee, whose specialties are Southside Virginia (an area also much studied by John W. Pritchett and much earlier by John Bennett Boddie II) and the Albemarle district of North Carolina. This last state has been hugely understudied, as regards compiled genealogy, in the last generation.

With his latest work, "Order of First Families of North Carolina--Registry of Ancestors, Volume 1," Mr. Brayton has begun a regional compendium that we hope will be equal in breadth and detail to "Adventurers of Purse & Person, Virginia," "The Ark and the Dove Adventurers," and "The Welcome Claimants." A second volume is underway, and I am delighted that GPC will be distributing this work widely.

Brayton's earlier volumes are also now available from GPC and include various primary sources for Norfolk and Southampton counties, Virginia, and Currituck County, North Carolina; transcribed North Carolina provincial wills (two volumes); and a series on Surry and Isle of Wight counties, Virginia. This last includes various volumes of court orders, wills, and deeds, plus genealogies of the Pitt, John Jennings, and Thomas and Robert Harris families. Additional volumes include a meticulously researched and documented work on the entire American ancestry, both New England and Southern, of playwright Tennessee Williams; a monograph on the Robertson family, well known in Tennessee and Texas history; and the progeny of Cheney Boyce and Richard Craven. This considerable body of work is ongoing and, until recently, had been published privately and in limited quantities. Now, with the GPC imprimatur, they will become widely known and, I hope, readily available in most American genealogical collections. Brayton's future work, no doubt, will be widely distributed as well.

John Anderson Brayton has also contributed to my own compendium, "The Royal Descents of 600 Immigrants." To that work he added or changed lines for Mrs. Mary Batt Ashe Livingston, Henry and Thomas Batte, Thomas Jefferson ancestor Christopher Branch, Christopher Calthorpe, Daniel Dobyns, John Fisher, and, to the volume's Addendum, Mrs. Abigail Smith Burwell (a forebear of the two presidents Harrison), Thomas Jernegan, Gov. Seth Southill, and Mrs. Frances Baldwin Townshend Jones Williams. Most of these last royal descents appeared in journal articles, and several were added to "Adventurers of Purse & Person, Virginia."

I would now say, again, given Mr. Dorman's retirement, that John Anderson Brayton is the leading living author of compiled Southern genealogy. For abstracts, records, and indexes, the greatest living Southern genealogists are Lloyd Bockstruck and Brent Holcomb.

Every generation, especially in Southern genealogy (which covers a huge geographical area), pursues the interests of its leading scholars. I regret the termination of "The Virginia Genealogist"--to which both Bockstruck and Brayton were recent contributors--but I welcome a major North Carolina scholar of the Albemarle and the two leading transcribers of Southern records. I look forward to more books by these colleagues and heartily recommend that the entire corpus of each of these three scholars occupy prominent places, often on reference shelves, in each Southern library with a genealogy collection--and in all national libraries as well.

COMPLETE COLLECTION OF VIRGINIA & NORTH CAROLINA BOOKS by John

VIRGINIA TITLES:

COLONIAL FAMILIES of Surry and Isle of Wight Counties, Virginia. In Eight Volumes

This eight-volume series consists of two types of books pertaining to the early genealogy of Surry and Isle of Wight counties in Virginia. The genealogies trace the various families in a six-generation format that includes all records, documents, and discussions of descent. The other books in the series consist of abstracts or transcriptions of the records of Isle of Wight County.

[VOLUME 1]: The Five Thomas Harrises of Isle of Wight, County, Virginia

This work represents a detailed corrective to earlier research on the Thomas Harrises conducted by John Bennett Boddie and other genealogists. The five focal points of the study are: (1) Thomas Harris, the testator of 1688, (2) Thomas Harris, the testator of 1672 (whose son John owned land in Lancaster Co., VA), (3) Thomas Harris, Jr., (4) Thomas Harris, the testator of 1729 and probably son of Edward, and (5) Thomas Harris of Chipchoakes, Surry Co., VA.

VOLUME 2: The Descendants of Robert Harris of Isle of Wight County, Virginia

Here Mr. Brayton traces the descendants of daughter Mary Harris, who married (1) Anthony Spiltimber and (2) Matthew Swann. The allied families include Arrington, Bynum, Carrell, Crafford, Drew, Fort, Hilliard, House, Jones, Macon, Phillips, and Sugars.

NORTH CAROLINA (and Tennessee) TITLES:

ORDER OF FIRST FAMILIES of North Carolina--Registry of Ancestors. Volume 1

Membership in the distinguished Order of the First Families of North Carolina requires having an ancestor who lived in North Carolina before it became a royal colony on July 12, 1729. The work at hand--the first in a series--proposes to describe the genealogies of the organization's qualifying ancestors. Undertaken with the blessing of the Order of the First Families, most of Mr. Brayton's genealogies follow each ancestor's family for a full first and second generation, down to the fourth, with drop-charts describing descent to members.

The ancestors in Volume 1 are: John Alston, Sr., of Chowan Co.; William Bennett of Northampton Co.; John and James Drake of Bertie Co., and John Collins; Gov. William Drummond; Nathaniel Everett of Tyrell Co.; William Bridgers, John Cotton Osborne, and Simon Jeffreys; Capt. John Speir; William Whitehead; Benjamin Laker of Perquimans Co.; John Mann II; Thomas Mann II; Dr. Godfrey Spruill; Ann Walker; Henry Norman I and II; and Thomas Vinson of Surry Co., VA, and Northampton Co., NC.

FEATURED BOOKS & CDs for November

We are pleased to announce the release of Part Five (as well as a reprint of Part Four) at this time.

All of our other publications this month represent reprints of classic reference books in American genealogy. These eight titles encompass some of the earliest recorded marriages of colonial America; a study of the signers of the "Mayflower" Compact; genealogies of the early families of Herkimer County, New York; genealogies and source records of Allegheny and Lancaster counties, Pennsylvania; and wills and administrations of Isle of Wight, Surry, and Fauquier counties, Virginia.

VIRGINIA NORTHERN NECK LAND GRANTS, 1800-1862 [Volume IV]

The "headright" system, widely used for acquiring land in Virginia, was never recognized in Virginia's Northern Neck. People wanting to acquire land there had to purchase a warrant and obtain a survey before they were issued a grant. The original Grant Books, now on microfilm, were used in making this four-volume series of abstracts, and they generally provide the following information: name of grantee, dates of warrant and survey, date and location of grant, amount of acreage, names of former owners/occupiers, names of adjacent property owners, and, often, names of heirs and other family members. Volume IV, together with Volume III (temporarily out of print), comprises about 10,000 abstracts naming 25,000 Northern Neck residents.

LYNNHAVEN PARISH REGISTER, 1838-1913
