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BOOKS BY LOUISE FOLEY Capture Early Virginia Land Patents

Consider the following 17th-century Virginia land patent abstract:

"MATHEW PRICE, son and heire to JOHN PRICE, late of Va., labourer, 150 acs. Henrico Co., upon Turkey Island Cr., 23 May 1638, p. 558. E. by S. upon sd. Cr., W. by N. toward Brems, S. by W. upon land granted to his late father, now in possession of his mother ANN HALLOM, widdowe, towards the gr. River & N. by E. into the woods. Due in right of his father who had a patent of 150 acs. Granted 20 Feb. 1619. by SIR GEORGE YEARDLY."

It is no exaggeration to say that this patent-in-brief, filed by Mathew Price of Henrico County, holds a wealth of information. It tells us the names of Mathew's parents, including his mother's maiden name; the precise location of the land--including landmarks and water courses--the date the patent was filed, and the name and date of the grant upon which Mathew's patent is based.

Not every early land patent identifies the relatives of the patentee; however, patents always place him at a particular time and place and, almost always, state the names of the owners of the lands adjacent to the patent--tempting clues, in other words, for the genealogist as detective.

Mathew Price's patent was originally abstracted for publication by Louise Pledge Heath Foley for the first book of a three-volume series entitled, EARLY VIRGINIA FAMILIES Along the James River: Their Deep Roots and Tangled Branches. Volume I covers the patents for Henrico and Goochland counties from 1632 to 1732. Volume II pertains to Charles City and Prince George counties, while the concluding volume takes up the patents for James City and Surry counties. Each volume includes a map of the area that shows the names of the families associated with their respective properties, many of them having resided in the area over many generations. EARLY VIRGINIA FAMILIES Along the James River: Their Deep Roots and Tangled Branches. VOLUME I: Henrico County--Goochland County

Louise Foley abstracted the land records from the 14 volumes of Patent Books for the period 1632 to 1732 pertaining to Henrico County and that part of Henrico that was removed to form Goochland County. The abstracts give the name of the patentee, location and acreage of the patent, date of settlement, copious references to family members and owners of adjoining properties, and, most important, the names of the settlers brought over as "headrights." The final section of the book contains the Quit Rent Rolls for Henrico County, Charles City County, and New Kent County, 1704-05.

This volume pertains to Charles City County and that part of Charles City County south of the James River from which Prince George County was formed in 1703. The main body of the text consists of a chronological series of land patent abstracts giving the name of the patentee, location and acreage of the patent, date of settlement, references to family members and owners of adjoining properties, and, most important, the names of the thousands of settlers brought over as "headrights." Mrs. Foley has also transcribed the Quit Rent Rolls for Charles City County and Prince George County for 1704-05.

Paul Heinegg has here assembled genealogical evidence on more than 300 Maryland and Delaware black families (naming nearly 6,000 individuals), with copious documentation from the federal censuses of 1790 to 1810 and colonial sources consulted at the Maryland Hall of Records, county archives, and other repositories. The author offers documentation proving that most of these free black families descended from mixed-race children who were the progeny of white women and African-American men. While some of these families would claim Native American ancestry, Mr. Heinegg offers evidence to show that they were instead the direct descendants of mixed-race children.

BLACK ROOTS in Southeastern Connecticut, 1650-1900

The authors of this work spent eight years gathering every shred of information they could find on approximately 2,000 African-American families who inhabited one or more of 26 counties in southeastern Connecticut. Their sources consisted primarily of U.S. census records from 1790 through 1870 and secondarily of manumission records, deeds, probate records, diaries, church records, and military records. There is an amazing amount of information on blacks who were living in an area that, on the eve of the Revolutionary War, had one of the largest slave populations in New England. The brief introduction summarizes some of the challenges of investigating black roots, while the bibliography, name index, and subject index make using the book quite easy.

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FEATURED CD Contains New Englanders-to-Nova Scotia Journal Articles

Published between 1896 and 1910, George Brown's columns in the "Yarmouth [Nova Scotia] Herald" focused almost exclusively on New England families who migrated to Nova Scotia around the time of the American Revolution, many of them descended from Mayflower colonists. In article after article, Brown traced these families from their earliest known origins in the Old World down to the end of the 19th century, his combined output amounting to an encyclopedia of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, families.

In 1993, GPC published an indexed, consolidated edition of the Brown articles entitled, "Yarmouth, Nova Scotia Genealogies." Assembled, re-typeset, and indexed by William and Martha Reamy, "Yarmouth, Nova Scotia Genealogies" refers to about 60,000 individuals, making it the centerpiece in published Nova Scotia genealogy.

ONTARIO AND NOVA SCOTIA SETTLERS, 1796-1860

While no single body of records identifies all immigrants and settlers in Nova Scotia and Ontario before Confederation in 1867, the six books included on this CD comprise the largest pool of information on early Canadian settlers available, naming more than 130,000 settlers from Ireland, Scotland, England, and North America, many of them Loyalists from disbanded regiments or pro-British refugees fleeing New York and New England. Based on the best primary and secondary sources available, these works contain a mix of data featuring name, occupation, residence, place of origin, age, family members, name of ship, date of arrival, military affiliation, and land grants.

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A DEFINITIVE WORK on the Founding Families of Maryland

On November 22, 1633, the 358-ton "Ark" and the 26-ton "Dove" departed from the Isle of Wight carrying the founders of the Maryland colony. (The "Dove," badly damaged in a storm, returned to England for repairs before rejoining the "Ark" several months later in the Antilles.) The two ships ultimately landed at St. Clement's Island in southern Maryland on March 25, 1634.

The 125 passengers of the "Ark" and the "Dove" sailed at the behest of Cecil Calvert, the Catholic Lord Proprietor of Maryland, who stocked the vessels with enough food and supplies to last, hopefully, for an entire year in the wilderness. At the outset, Lord Baltimore, as the proprietor was also known, expected Maryland to become a Catholic refuge for his co-religionists. In the end, he was remarkably successful in attracting far more Protestant countrymen "by offering them free land and the customary political rights that landholders in England enjoyed. Calvert also promised real religious liberty for virtually all Christians." In fact, it was Calvert's Maryland--and not Roger Williams' Rhode Island--where religious freedom and the separation of church and state first gained a foothold in the New World.

Given this heritage, nearly three centuries later, in 1910, a number of descendants of Maryland's founding families formed The Society of The Ark and The Dove in order to perpetuate the memory of its pioneers and to promote fellowship among their descendants. Over the years, the Society has encouraged research in early Maryland history and supported a variety of commemorative institutions, such as the Historic St. Mary's City Foundation.

Our publication, *THE ARK AND THE DOVE ADVENTURERS*, published under the auspices of The Society of The Ark and The Dove, is the organization's latest contribution to Maryland genealogy and history.

Edited by noted Maryland genealogists George Ely Russell and Donna Valley Russell, *THE ARK AND THE DOVE ADVENTURERS* furnishes "documented accounts of the first settlers of Maryland in 1634, followed by compiled genealogies of their descendants, if any, extended to the fifth generation when possible."

The first part of the book describes the family and descendants of Sir George Calvert (Cecil's father), the first Lord Baltimore. The remainder traces the progeny of the following passengers: James Baldrige, Major Thomas Baldrige, Anam Benum, John Briscoe, William Brown, Leonard Calvert, Thomas Cornwallis, Ann Cox, William Edwin, Cuthbert Fenwick, Captain Henry Fleete, Richard Gerard, Richard Gilbert, Thomas Greene, John Hallows, Nicholas Harvey, Richard Lowe, John Neville, Richard Nevitt, John Price, Robert Smith, Ann Smithson, Robert Vaughan, and Robert Wiseman. *THE ARK AND THE DOVE ADVENTURERS* concludes with a list of passengers who are known not to have had descendants and some later arrivals previously and erroneously claimed as 1634 descendants.

Complete with a name index to 6,000 individuals, *THE ARK AND THE DOVE ADVENTURERS* is the starting point for 17th-century Maryland genealogy.

A companion volume to his 1975 work, "Maryland Marriages, 1634-1777," Robert Barnes' new book is a collection of 6,500 marriage records found in sources other than church records, closing the gap in the historical record and providing a clear alternative to traditional genealogical sources. The records in this work are based on both direct and indirect references. With a bibliography and a full-name index of brides and others mentioned in the text, this work completes the tableau of sources available to the researcher in the area of colonial Maryland genealogy--the final installment of a resource that began to prove its usefulness more than 30 years ago.
