Pension rolls--or lists of veterans entitled to receive pensions--were frequently published as Congressional reports. All such reports published between 1792 and 1841, totaling 12 volumes and containing the names of approximately 120,000 pensioners, were reprinted over many years by GPC. Now, these invaluable pension rolls are available on a single Family Archive CD, complete with an electronic name index that enables you to locate the pensioner quickly and efficiently.

#### NAVAL PENSIONERS OF THE UNITED STATES

Beginning in 1800, pensions for U.S. naval personnel were awarded on the basis of death or disability during active service. Taking its cue from the ever-increasing number of applicants, this new work presents information on some 3,000 seamen and sailors who were awarded pensions in accordance with the various acts of Congress and special acts of the Senate or House of Representatives. Each entry provides the names of the veteran,

his widow, his children and heirs, and, sometimes, other family members. Altogether, the work identifies some 5,000 or more individuals, most of whom, it should be noted, appear in no other federal pension records. As a point of interest, the majority of naval pensioners were from the states of Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and New York.

Each entry contains a brief paragraph on the officer, giving his state or country where born, state from which originally appointed, date of induction, rank, date of discharge, promotions, medals, battles participated in, and, in about a fifth of the entries, date of death after leaving the Army.

NEW YORK COLONIAL MUSTER ROLLS, 1664-1775. In Two Volumes

Originally published as appendices, or supplements, to the "Annual Report of the State Historian of the State of New York" for the years 1897 and 1898, these two volumes contain transcriptions of all colonial muster rolls on deposit in the state capital at Albany for the years 1664 to 1775. This work identifies approximately 30,000 men who served in the various militia companies during the period before the Revolution, including privateers and free-lancers such as Captain William Kidd. At a minimum, each militiaman is noted in connection with his date of enlistment, company and company commander, rank, and place of residence. More often than not, the muster rolls also include place of birth, age, occupation, height, and a physical description.

2008 EDITION of "The Royal Descents of 600 Immigrants" by Gary Boyd Roberts  
Expands on Its Predecessors

This year, Gary Boyd Roberts again has assembled all recent royal descent research, some yet unpublished, and produced an authoritative, newly up-to-date compendium. In the 2006 edition of THE ROYAL DESCENTS OF 600 IMMIGRANTS to the American Colonies or the United States (RD 600), he added 18 new immigrants to his previous 650. In this 2008 edition, he has added 27 more, so that with a few disproofs (Curwens/Corwins of Massachusetts and New York, Byes of Pennsylvania, and Edwardses, one Evans and Hugh Jones of Pennsylvania) the total number of immigrants is now 687.

New immigrants treated in the 2008 edition of RD 600 include Mrs. Jane Greene Poole (wife of the earlier treated William) and Mrs. Margaret Estouteville Shepard (ancestor of the two presidents Adams), both of Massachusetts; Mrs. Henrietta Constantia Worsam Meade and Charles Willing of Pennsylvania; and various Virginia immigrants, many developed by GPC author John Anderson Brayton. These new Virginians include Mrs. Elizabeth Wood Barcroft, an ancestor of Jimmy Carter; John Baskerville; Benjamin Harrison, immigrant ancestor of the presidents Harrison; Mrs. Dorothy Walker Jones; Philip Ludwell, ancestor of the Stratford Lees and the first husband of Martha Washington; and Stephens Thompson, ancestor of the Masons of Gunston Hall.

Mr. Roberts is especially pleased to include two new North Carolinians--John Alston (a third cousin of John Alston of South Carolina) and Mrs. Ann Coddington Fenner, an ancestor of Senator John McCain.

Also included, in Appendix VIII to the Introduction of the 2008 edition, are new descriptions of recently revised, likely but unproved, royal descents for the five Winslow brothers, John Whitney, and John Whitcomb, all of Massachusetts.

With this enlarged compendium and the works of Douglas Richardson on Plantagenet and Magna Carta ancestry, which add much biographical detail on many medieval figures found in Mr. Roberts' book (and cover more than 200 of the latter's 687 immigrants), royal descent literature has reached a new level of comprehensiveness and reliability. GPC is proud to offer the public these benchmark works that lead to an almost 800-year expansion (ca. 900-1700) of the ancestry of countless Americans.

MORE CLEARFIELD BOOKS for August

EASTERN CHEROKEE BY BLOOD, 1906-1910. Volume VI: Applications 18,061-21,880 from the U.S. Court of Claims, 1906-1910. Cherokee-Related Records of Special Commissioner Guion Miller

On May 28, 1909, Mr. Guion Miller, representing the Interior Department, submitted to Congress his findings with respect to 45,847 separate applications for compensation (totaling about 90,000 individual Native American claimants). Miller qualified about 30,000 persons inhabiting 19 states to share in the fund. Ninety percent of these individuals were living west of the Mississippi River, but all of them were considered to be Eastern Cherokee by blood, that is, descendants of the Cherokee Nation that had been evicted from Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, and Tennessee in 1835.

Volume VI in this series of Guion Miller record transcriptions adds 3,800 applications, bringing the total to nearly 22,000. Transcriber Jeff Bowen has culled every shred of genealogical value from the applications, which in every case provides the application number, applicant's name and city of residence, number of other persons in the applicant's family, references to family members found in other applications, and the disposition of the application. The researcher will find references to more than 5,000 Cherokee descendants in this fully indexed volume, bringing the total number of descendants in the six volumes to nearly 40,000.

SCOTLAND DURING THE PLANTATION OF ULSTER: The People of Dumfries and Galloway, 1600-1699

The latest book from David Dobson is designed to assist persons of Scots-Irish descent whose forebears may have originated in Dumfries and Galloway during the 17th century.

Persons from this region of Scotland ultimately figured in the relocation to Ulster of the 17th century. Since only three of 86 parish registers of the Church of Scotland prior to 1685 survive for this area, Mr. Dobson's researches attempt to fill the void as best as possible. The volume is based, overwhelmingly, on primary sources in the National Archives of Scotland and Edinburgh, and it is fully referenced. The inhabitants are arranged alphabetically and are identified by a town or townland, date, and source. In some instances, Mr. Dobson includes additional details, such as names of parents, education, occupation, and place/date of death. The major families in the Dumfries/Galloway region were Gordon, Irving, Johnston, Kennedy, Maxwell, McDowall, McKie, and McLellan, and many are featured in the volume.

### VIRGINIA SOLDIERS OF 1776 Compiled from Documents in the Virginia Land Office. In Three Volumes

This monumental work is based on official government records on file in the Virginia Land Office and on documents in the Archives Department of the Virginia State Library. The records are of several classes--bounty warrants, military certificates, exchange warrants, and land vouchers--and they establish absolute proof of Revolutionary service and of the descent of bounty land. Some soldiers took up their grants, moving with their families to make new homes, but others assigned their land to sons or other relatives, while still others sold their interest and title in the land to other pioneer families. Through these claims, much useful genealogical data comes to light; for, among other things, they demonstrate proof of relationship. Annexed to these claims are certificates of heirship, wills and powers of attorney, dates of birth and death, and place of residence of the Revolutionary soldier.

This book includes a good deal more than a roster of Revolutionary soldiers, though indeed a significant portion of the work is given over to a list of such soldiers. The list was compiled from the Revolutionary Army Accounts of North Carolina in the State Archives at Raleigh, showing claims against North Carolina for service by about 1,500 men of the western-most counties of Washington and Sullivan, later Tennessee.

Besides census records, the work includes lists of 1,704 marriageable girls, a 1726 list of persons requesting slaves, landowner lists, and a list of persons massacred at Fort Rosalie in 1729.
